As we approach the fourth year of Windows 10, most users now return to the settings app - even in desktop mode - because it is convenient. With a little caution, you can easily check to make sure your panel box is working properly. To see if it's stuck panel. Visually check each one to make sure the switch is set to AISH. Click and presto, you're there. A second Desktop option: Press Windows+I (as in igloo) on your keyboard, and this option enables the Charms Bar-like Settings menu, which includes Control Panel. Control Panel is a great way to access music controls and basic iPad settings from anywhere on the iPad, including when playing games, navigating Facebook or web.' You can also turn on the iPad's Control Panel from the lock screen, which is great if you want to turn off the sound or skip a song. These guidelines apply to iOS 12 or later devices. The control panel has moved a bit in the last few updates, but you can access it by swiping down from the upper right corner of the screen on any page. On the lock screen that appears after you wake up your iPad, but before unlocking it, a horizontal line appears in that corner below the watch and battery indicators. The control panel provides quick access to various settings such as Airplane Mode and music controls. Some expand if you touch and hold. For example, the first section that contains Airplane Mode opens and shows additional information about each button in it. The expanded view allows you to preview more controls in the panel. Airplane Mode — This switch shuts down all communication on iPad, including Wi-Fi and data connection. AirDrop Settings — AirDrop is a useful feature that lets you quickly share photos and websites with someone in the same room. You can access sharing features via the Share button on iPad. In the control panel, you can turn off AirDrop, set it to receive content only from contacts, or turn it on for everyone. Wi-Fi — If you have an iPad with a 4G data connection, receiving a weak Wi-Fi signal can sometimes be aggravating when your data connection is much faster. This easy access to turn off Wi-Fi allows you to save on hunting through your iPad settings. Bluetooth — Bluetooth can burn your battery if you always leave it on. This setting lets you turn it off quickly to save power. Music Controls — These controls include standard playback, pause, and jump buttons. If you hold down your finger on music controls, the enlarged window allows you to jump to a specific point in the current song, adjust the volume, share the music on Apple TV, or open the Music app. Brightness — Adjusting brightness is a great way to save battery life, but sometimes you can get too low to see your screen comfortably. The control center provides quick access to the slider. Volume — The quickest way to adjust the volume on your iPad is to use the physical volume buttons on the edge of the iPad. But you can also stop by the control center and change it there. AirPlay — Apple's AirPlay feature allows you to send audio and video and share your screen with an AirPlay-enabled device Allows. You can use AirPlay with Apple TV Send videos to your TV from apps like Netflix or Hulu. It can also display the entire iPad screen. With this control, you can turn on screen mirroring. Lock Orientation — The ability to automatically steer the iPad itself is great unless you keep the change at the right angle when you want to turn it around. This button will solve this dilemma. Quiet - need to kill the sound on your iPad quickly? The mute button will work. Do Not Disturb - Another feature that is more useful for phones, do not disturb if you get a lot of Facetime calls can still come in handy. Timer/Clock — This button opens the Watch app, where you can set a timer or alarm or run the stopwatch. Camera — Sometimes if you're trying to remember where you moved the Camera icon on your home screen, you can now quickly access it in the Control Panel. If you want to take a selfie, hold down the camera button until you activate the front camera. Camera.

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
